Contributors

Dr Jane O'Brien holds a PhD in History from the University of Galway on the Sister of Mercy run Irish Industrial School System from the 1860s to 1930s. She has worked as a historical tour guide for over 20 years, running her own business Ennis Walking Tours.

Dr Liam Irwin is the former Head of History at Mary Immaculate College, Limerick. His works include *The Diocese of Limerick: an illustrated history* and he co-edited *Limerick, History and Society*. He is Honorary Editor of the North Munster Antiquarian Journal as a member of the Thomond Archaeological and Historical Society.

Dr Kieran Hickey lectures in the Geography Department of University College Cork. His main research focus is on historical and current climate change. He is author of *Wolves in Ireland: A Natural and Cultural History*.

Dr Susan Arthure has a PhD in archaeology from Flinders University. Her research focuses on the material lives of those Irish who migrated across the globe post Famine. Her research into the community of Baker's Flat in Australia identified the first complete exemplar of a clachán (traditional Irish settlement system) to be recognised outside of Ireland to date.

Dr Peter Connell completed a PhD in Trinity College Dublin in 2017 on the history of public housing in Irish towns in the years 1890-1945. He is the author of *The land and people of County Meath, 1750-1850* (Four Courts Press, 2004) and is active in local history groups in his native Meath.

Lucille Ellis holds a degree in History and English and has a longstanding interest in local and family history. Lucille's books include *Women of Clare, Erasmus Smith House*, *Ennis at Work in the 19th century* and *Bindon Street and Bank Place*. She is a member of Clare Roots Society. Lucille also worked on the *RMS Leinster* project researching and writing the biographies of those on board the ill-fated boat.

Dr Terry Dunne was appointed Historian in Residence with Clare Libraries for 2024. Terry has a Doctorate in Sociology from Maynooth University which examined so-called threatening letters created in agrarian social conflict in pre-Famine Ireland. He has recently edited, with John Cunningham of Galway University, *Spirit of Revolution: Ireland from below 1917-1923* (Four Courts Press, 2024).

Dr Joe Power is a Clare historian whose works include *Clare and the War of Independence* and *Clare and the Civil War.*

Aidan Gilsenan is a PhD student in Maynooth University and a recipient of the Irish Research Council doctoral scholarship. He recently contributed a chapter to Sarah-Anne Buckley, Oliver Coquelin and Francis Devine (eds) 'Retreat from revolution': Irish working class politics in the 1920s (Umiskin, 2024).

Dr. Jane Halloran is a professional genealogist and researcher. She attained her M.A. in Local History from the University of Limerick in 2017 and recently completed her PhD entitled *Networks of Necessity: The Clunes, Clare and Connecticut Connections*. Jane tutors the Certificate in Local History programme at the Irish Workhouse Centre and she also tutors at Mary Immaculate College in Limerick.

Michael Talty is Executive Librarian in the Local Studies Centre of Clare Libraries.

Ciara Fahy is Archivist with Clare Libraries.

John Rattigan is Curator of Clare Museum

Ciara Carew works in DeValera Library, Ennis. She is a storyteller with an MA in History.














